Pieter found the blacksmith work he had been hired for could be done very quickly which left him time to shoe horses and do repairs for other dairies. He was able to get ahead and soon had his own blacksmith shop. He was able to retire when he was sixty.

As the city of Regina expanded, the Crusons found themselves sitting on some pretty valuable property. The city wanted to build a subdivision so gave the family a good price for their land.

In the meantime, one of the original members of Rocky First CRC, Max V. was single and working for a seismic crew in the Rocky area. In 1952, their work took them to Saskatchewan in search of oil. Often the crew was working on Sunday so Max was unable to get to church. He had heard there were other Dutch people in the vicinity and through a friend was directed to talk to the C's. He caught up to them as they were driving off from a friends' house. He knocked on their car window and introduced himself saying he wanted to learn more about the church. The family was pleased to oblige and Max became a regular visitor at their home on his days off. When Ella graduated high school she and Max became engaged and two years later they married.

By 1962, they had three little children; Dick, Marlene and Peter. Max's brother John was finding that his business in Rocky Mountain House, John's Rocky Agencies, had more business than he could handle so he contacted Max to see if he would come from Saskatchewan and be in business with him.

Max agreed and found that he loved working in this business where he could do accounting, insurance, real estate and notary public work. His brother John, on the other hand was no longer enthusiastic and wanted to become a teacher. Max agreed to buy him out and John fulfilled his desire and became a teacher in British Columbia.

...and as the saying goes...the rest is history. Two more girls and a boy were added to the family and have blessed our local church with their musical talents ever since.

Memories leading up to our 75th Anniversary

V. Family

Fed up by the Dutch government and the aftermath of World War 2, this successful family decided they were going to emigrate. Their life had already been turned upside down and now the cleanup had to begin. There were dead bodies everywhere - both animal and human. They couldn't enjoy the seaside because the beaches had been mined.

The Emigration Society was urging people to emigrate to promote the Christian Reformed Church in Canada. So, upon seeing a wanted advertisement for a blacksmith, Pieter C. made application through the immigration society. He was 43 years old when he left his birth country behind and emigrated to Regina, Saskatchewan. His parents and his wife's parents were not at all in favour of them going.

In October, Pieter went by himself and said he could always come back if things didn't work out. He was pleased with the job that awaited him and upon obtaining a lease on a house, he sent for the family. Meantime, the owners cancelled the lease but Pieter knew the Lord would prevail so he didn't cancel their plans.

He found a house on the outskirts of the city and decided he would buy it. He had saved some money from his new job and had some of the \$100.00 he had been allowed to bring from the Netherlands. That wasn't enough but he knew his wife would have another \$100.00 to contribute and his three children would each have \$50.00. The down payment was \$300.00.

The family arrived December 21. The temperature was minus 60 degrees below zero. What a welcome! Pieter met his wife Lena at the bank so they could deal with the down payment.

The little house had power but no water and sewer and badly needed some paint. Ever the optimist, Ella's mom said they could soon get it shipshape. Her older daughter quickly found employment as a live-in nanny/housekeeper so that left 14 year old Ella and her 4 year old brother Isaac at home.

Since Pieter had come in October, his shipping container had already arrived. Thus, he had a bicycle to go back and forth to work. Ella already knew a lot of English so was placed in grade ten. A kind neighbour came to help her mom learn more of this new language, telling her the names of the various household items.

New flooring was layed, the house had been given a good cleaning and their little house got painted in the spring. It felt more like home when the rest of their belongings arrived in February.

IRAN: Large Increase in Christian Prison Sentences Last Year Source: Article18

According to a recently published report by Article18, at least 96 Christians were sentenced to prison in Iran during 2024 for a combined total of 263 years' imprisonment. This statistic indicates a sixfold increase from the previous year, in which 22 Christians were arrested for a combined total of 43.5 years.

While the report demonstrates a significant increase in the total number of Christians arrested annually, it also reveals a notable increase in the length of their prison terms. This informative report can be downloaded from Article Eighteen.

As the new year commences, the situation facing Iranian Christians has not improved. More than 40 followers of Jesus were arrested just this past December for participating in Christmas celebrations. Since the detained Christians have not yet received their prison sentences, this latest number of arrested believers was not included when calculating the statistics for 2024.

The recently occurring arrests took place while the members of Iran's judiciary were boasting that Christian prisoners had been given a five-day leave from prison over the Christmas season. However, this brief furlough was not permitted for those whose convictions related to "acting against national security" – a charge commonly imposed on the country's Christians.

- Prayerfully remember the recently arrested believers, along with the many other Iranian Christians who are currently serving prison sentences because of their faith in Christ.
- Pray that international leaders would call attention to the persecution of Christian converts in Iran and thus put pressure on the country's governing officials to enact positive changes.
- In the midst of the government's attempts to suppress the Christian faith, praise God for the resilient advancements made by His church in Iran. May this continued growth in numbers also reflect the greater spiritual depth that's taking place within the lives of all those who have chosen to faithfully follow in the ways of Christ.

ERITREA: 44 Christians Imprisoned, Including 27 Students Sources: Release Eritrea, Church in Chains

In early December, Eritrean security forces raided a house where 27 secondary school students had gathered together for prayer and worship. The Christian students – most of whom ranged in age from 14 to 16 years old – were taken to a police station and held in custody for a few days before being transferred to the Mai Serwa prison which is located along the outskirts of Asmara.

In a separate case, another 17 Christians were also recently arrested and sent to the Mai Serwa prison. At the time of publishing this report, no further information on this case was available. The Mai Serwa prison is the same facility where several members of a Christian musical group, known as the Mahalians, continue to be detained.

Dr. Berhane Asmelash from Release Eritrea believes that the recently occurring large-scale arrests of believers – and particularly Christian young people – reflect the Eritrean government's "desperate attempt to control the growth of the evangelical population in the country." Based on exponential increases in incidents of Christian persecution over the past 20 years, Dr. Berhane is concerned about the possibility that higher levels of opposition may take place in the coming year – including more arrests and harsher treatment towards believers.

- Please pray for the strength and endurance of these recently arrested Christians.
- May all of our Christian brothers and sisters who are presently being detained in prisons throughout Eritrea receive peace, comfort, courage and hope from the reassuring presence of the Holy Spirit.
- In spite of ongoing opposition from the government, pray for the continued growth of God's church in this nation, resulting in multitudes accepting Jesus as their personal Saviour and Lord.
